TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) for the year ended 31 July 2011

Key Achievements

During the year the University of Bath Students' Union (BUSU) continued to embed and implement the excellent procedures and practices developed through our commitment to continuous improvement within the following quality measurement systems:

- 1. **Gold Students' Union Evaluation Initiative (SUEI) Award (Silver in 2008**) becoming one of the four Unions nationally to achieve this standard.
- 2. **Gold Green Impact Award** (Silver in 2009, Bronze in 2008) which recognises our excellent environmental practices.
- 3. **Investors in People** award retained for the 12th successive year.
- 4. **Investors in Volunteering** (due to be re-assessed late 2011)
- 5. **Gold Best Bar None** (2011) awarded to both licensed venues within the Union and recognising our commitment to responsible licensing.
- 6. Legal Services Quality Mark (retained following reassessment 2010).

Charitable Registration

As from the 29th July 2011 the Students' Union successfully registered as a charity with the Charity Commission (charity number 1143154).

Strategic Direction

During 2010/11 BUSU continued to build upon its reputation as one of the best developed and well managed students' unions in the UK. BUSU's vision is:

"To be a leader in promoting change through a highly influential student voice and in delivering nationally recognised, innovative student development and peer support programmes"

To enable BUSU to work towards this vision six core aims were agreed. Together they form the basis of the Three Year Strategic Plan. They are:

- 1. Representing the Views of Students to Promote Change To promote change by supporting and representing student views to the University and other relevant bodies
- 2. **Engaging With Our Members -** To actively involve students in the development of BUSU by engaging them through consultation, communication and campaigns
- 3. **Providing Development Opportunities -** To help students maximise their potential and to provide opportunities to foster well rounded Bath Graduates, future leaders and innovators
- 4. **Supporting an Active Student Community -** To provide students with advice and support and with opportunities for integration, for pursuing their own interests, for making life-long friends and the ability to form networks for informal learning
- 5. **Engagement with External Communities -** To develop initiatives to enhance the reputation of the University of Bath and the Students' Union within the wider community

6. **Organisational Management -** To ensure the BUSU is efficiently and effectively managed, within an agreed ethical and environmental framework, to provide students with a high quality students' union experience

Central to BUSU's work with its members has been the identification through the Engagement Strategy of the top 10 issues raised by students. These top 10 issues provided an agenda for change and a focus for engagement with the University and other stakeholders.

Support for our Members

BUSU provides a variety of services and facilities to support our members during their time at University.

During 2010/2011:

- Over 3,200 students were provided with specialist help in areas such as housing, academic issues, finance and health through the Advice and Representation Centre (ARC).
- The Union supported the activities of 81 societies and 49 sports clubs. This represented the participation of over 7,630 students.
- 916 students spent a total of 5,280 hours participating in a wide range of volunteering projects and activities.
- The Union actively supported the National Union of Students (NUS) 'Fund Our Future: Stop Education Cuts' campaign with a large contingent of officers and students attending the rally in London.

Academic representation continues to be a major feature and strength of the work in the Union. Over 300 undergraduate and postgraduate students were elected by almost 1,900 of their peers to serve as Academic Representatives. For the first time the Union established Faculty Academic Councils to reflect the change in the University's academic structure.

Commercial Operations

Following the transfer of BUSU's retail and catering operations to the University at the end of 2009/2010, Bars and Entertainments remained the principal focus for the Union's commercial activity during 2010/2011. Performance in this area was disappointing however, largely due to the failure of the principal club night early in the academic year.

Facilities (Student Centre)

At its meeting in May 2009, University Council agreed to the building of a new Student Centre at an estimated cost of £5.5 million. The new Centre opened in late September 2010 has been well received by students and has provided a focus for student life on campus and much needed social and informal learning space.

Financial Report

During the course of the year a funding model was agreed with the University to compensate the Union for the transfer of commercial operations and reducing income risk into future years.

For 2010/2011 the Income and Expenditure Account for the Students' Union shows an operating surplus for the year before repairs and maintenance costs of £10,068. During the year expenditure on the new Student Centre, relocation of the campus Post Office and essential office refurbishment totalled £687,302 (shown as repairs and maintenance). This expenditure was met from Union reserves.

The Balance Sheet continues to reflect a satisfactory financial position for the Union.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES AND RISK MANAGEMENT for the year ended 31 July 2011

The trustees' are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Union and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Union will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Union. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Union and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Risk Management

BUSU has adopted a formal Risk Management framework that embeds consideration of risk when reviewing the Union's Mission Statement, and developing the Strategic Development Plan within the Annual Planning and Budgeting Process. This approach is designed to directly aid the quality of Trustees and management decision-making, improve potential outcomes and provide the clear accountability required to all its members.

A Risk Management Charter exists to:

- formally document the strategies that BUSU follow on behalf of its members to reduce risk over the short and medium term time span;
- confirm that appropriate risk management policies and operational procedures are embedded within the day to day operations of the Union;
- provide a practical framework for the management and staff to follow.

Furthermore, each key risk is assessed and documented in the Risk Register (currently under review) under an appropriate category, and grouped together under additional classifications where relevant.

The Risk Register;

- Establishes the key risks within each category;
- Classifies the risks within each category where appropriate;
- Evaluates the likelihood and impact of the key risks and apply a weighting factor;
- Prioritises the risks based on the weighting to determine the most critical risks;
- Plans the response to controlling the risk.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF BATH STUDENTS UNION

We have audited the financial statements on pages 7 to 20.

This report is made solely to the Union's Trustees as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Union's Trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Union and the Union's Trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and auditors

The Trustees' responsibilities for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) are set out in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the information given in the Trustees' Report is not consistent with those financial statements, if the Union has not kept sufficient accounting records, if the Union's financial statements are not in agreement with these accounting records, or if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

We read the Report of the Trustees and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Trustees in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Union's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In our opinion:

- the financial statements give a true and fair view, in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice, of the state of the Union as at 31 July 2011 and of its deficit for the year then ended; and
- the information given in the Report of the Trustees is consistent with the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the year ended 31 July 2011

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Cash flow statement

The Trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the basis that the Union is small.

Consolidation

In the opinion of the Trustees, the Union and its subsidiary undertaking comprise a small group. The Union has therefore taken advantage of the exemption not to prepare group accounts.

Income

The annual grant from the University of Bath is intended to meet recurrent costs and is credited direct to the income and expenditure account. Other income is included in the income and expenditure account on a cash received basis or on a receivables basis where there is reasonable certainty of receipt.

Depreciation

Fixed assets are initially recorded at cost and depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:-

Leasehold buildings - 2-15 years
Equipment - 2-5 years
Motor vehicles - 4 years

Expenditure on refurbishments and repairs of assets that are not owned by the Union is expensed in the year.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost less any provision for diminution in value.

Accounting by charities – Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP)

The union registered with the Charity Commission on 29 July 2011 and as such has not been registered for a full year. As a result the Union is not yet required to adopt the SORP in the presentation of the Financial Statements. However, in accordance with the establishment of best practice, where appropriate, the Union will make disclosures in accordance with the SORP.

Taxation

No provision is made in these accounts for corporation tax as the Union is exempt from such taxes, as a result of having derived its charitable status from its parent governing body, University of Bath, provided that income is applied for charitable purposes.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) for the year ended 31 July 2011

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Pensions

The two principal pension schemes in which the Union participates are the Universities Superannuation Scheme and the Bath & North East Somerset Local Government Pension Scheme, both of which are defined benefit schemes, externally funded and contracted out of the State Earnings-Related Pension Scheme. Both funds are externally valued, normally every three years by professionally qualified independent actuaries using the projected unit method, the rates of contribution payable being determined by the trustees on the advice of the actuaries. In the intervening years, the actuaries review the progress of the schemes. Pension costs are assessed in accordance with the advice of the actuaries based on the latest actuarial valuations of the schemes and are accounted for on the basis of charging the cost of providing pensions over the estimated period during which the Union benefits from the employees' services.

25 PENSIONS

27 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Union is became a registered charity on 29 July 2011 but previously, for the purposes of the Charities Act 1993, derived charitable status from its governing parent body, the University of Bath. The Union is in receipt of a recurrent grant from the parent body of £921,332 (2010: £696,000).

The Union occupies a University building under an informal licence. The Union is charged by the University a contribution to the costs of maintaining the building. The amount charged in the year was £343,280 (2010: £343,280). This is a notional charge to the income and expenditure account for which equivalent income is shown within Note 2 – Grants Receivable.

The University also pays all wages and salaries on behalf of the union and recharges them accordingly.

29 CONTROLLING PARTY

The Union is controlled by the Board of Trustees comprising the Sabbatical Officers, who are subject to democratic election by the voting membership of the Union, and non-executive Trustees who are appointed by a simple majority of the Board of Trustees. The ultimate control of the Union is vested under the Articles of Governance in the Board of Trustees. As such no single person or entity controls the Union as defined by Financial Reporting Standard 8.
